New Year, New Mayor!



New to the position of Mayor, but not new to Fairview, Lloyd Campbell grew up on 105th Avenue in the home of his parents, Ron and Molly Campbell. Lloyd, Samantha and their two sons Tucker and Cooper now live in their home next to the old family residence, where Molly Campbell still resides.

In his growing years, Lloyd participated in Cubs, Scouts, Minor Hockey, Swim Team and all the other activities he and the neighboring Klemchuk kids could find. After completing high school at FHS, Lloyd worked at/with various businesses, including All Season Sports Centre, Big North Sports, Century 21 Real Estate, Ram Motors and Fairview Post. A FISHY STORY

The Town of Fairview, together with Alberta Sustainable Resources, Fish & Wildlife and the Alberta Conservation Association, is considering options for the future of Cummings Lake Fishery. Originally intended for Trout, the lake has become overrun by Perch. While some fisherman enjoy the Perch, the majority prefer Trout and the number of people fishing has declined. To bring the lake back to a Trout fishery, a total fish-kill may be required. That would mean relocating or losing the grass carp, which the Town of Fairview purchased to deal with the weed growth problem.

Council has asked for input from the public, especially those who fish the lake, as to how this should be handled. Should the lake be left as is, saving the grass carp but establishing a permanent perch fishery, or should a major undertaking be taken to drain and have winter-kill of all remaining species; then re-establish the Trout fishery. This could take a year or two to complete. You tell us! Call, email, write or stop in the office to express your opinions.
